On Friday May 5th, we will be celebrating the King's Coronation in school. We will be having a day of events in school which will culminate in some work and activities to showcase at the end of the day. As this is a family occasion, we would love for you to join us from 2:30pm for an Afternoon Tea style event to look at our showcase as well as share in some activities and games inside and out. You can collect your child as soon as you arrive if before 3:10, or at 3:10 as normal. We will be here until about 4:30/5:00pm so do come along at any time until then and stay. We will have some refreshments but you are more than welcome to bring your own Afternoon Tea to share with your family. Parents, carers, grandparents, aunts, uncles and siblings are all welcome. We look forward to seeing you all there.

Medicines.

We understand that there will be times when your child needs medication if they are poorly. Our policy is that where prescribed medications are concerned, we will administer them in accordance with the direction from the doctor. We also know that there are times your child may need medication that is not prescribed, such as paracetamol. We are happy to administer this medication but our policy states that we are only able to give one dose. If, after that does, your child's symptoms do not ease or improve then we will call you but we cannot administer any further doses. All medication must be handed into the school office and you will need to fill in a form. Medication must be in its original box or container. If you wish to see our policy for administering medicines it is available on the website or available from the school office.

PE Kits

Please can I remind you that your child needs to have their PE kits in school from Monday to Friday and it needs to include a separate sweatshirt or jumper from their school one. We try and go outside as much as possible, especially the older children, and if they fall over wearing their school one it can become wet or dirty. If your child's kit becomes particularly wet or dirty then we will send it home!

We are looking to get some more after school clubs up and running with the aim of offering one every day of the week. If you, or someone you know, feel able to offer some time and help run a club then please come and see us. It could be anything – craft, outdoor learning, games – the options are endless!

In science we have begun to look at vertebrates and invertebrates and our particular focus of bees, starting to think about why bees are important to us.

The children have had a super week settling back into school after the Easter break. In science they have been learning about different food groups and what makes a healthy meal. In music they have started a new unit where the focus is on rock music and have been listening to and moving to the pulse of music. They have also started to play the glockenspiel which is our instrument for this half term. In geography they have identified the River Ouse and looked at maps to see its journey from its source to the sea. They have also used grid references to locate different physical features on a map. In English we are looking at different explanation texts before we write our own and in art we have evaluated our Modroc fish sculptures. In maths the children have been busy measuring the length and height of different objects using cm, mm and m and they have been solving problems involving measuring. Well done Whitebeam.

Oak

Mathematician of the Week – Esther for becoming more and more confident in raising her hand to offer her thoughts in maths.

Reader of the Week – Lola for enthusiasm in reading 'The Hobbit'.

Writer of the Week - Maddie for independently using a dictionary to support her spelling within her narrative.

Shining Light of the Week (Year 4) – Leo for making brilliant choices in his learning behaviours this week.

Shining Light of the Week (Year 5) – Aleashia for putting in a huge effort with her learning.

Shining Light of the Week (Year 6) – Josh for a huge improvement in his attitude towards his learning and an excellent piece of narrative writing.

This week, Oak class have settled in wonderfully after the Easter holidays. The children started the week off by refining their narrative work based on 'Prisoner 42'. We focused on including modal verbs and played a game to support our learning on active and passive voice; the children behaved brilliant during the game with each group being on task and engaged with their learning. In maths, we have consolidated our learning of area and perimeter and dividing decimal numbers by 10, 100 and 1,000. Some children extended their learning by calculating the mean of a set of data. In our reading, many children have shown an interest in the text 'The Hobbit', so we have begun to read this in our guided session - making inferences, unpicking the vocabulary and discussing the genre. Our history learning is drawing to a close, as we finish off our learning about the Ancient Greeks and what their lasting legacy was. Great work this week, Oak class.

Message from Executive Headteacher

It has been lovely to see everyone again this week and we are looking forward to a busy Summer term with some super trips and opportunities for our children, including sporting, dramatic and artistic.

Teacher strikes

As you know, the situation has not yet been resolved and strikes continue. We will confirm for you by Monday at the latest the situation for each class but so that you can make arrangements, please note: It is highly likely that Oak class will be closed. Rowan and Whitebeam will be open as usual.

Scabies

Please be aware that Scabies is prevalent in Norfolk currently.

Scabies is a contagious skin condition caused by tiny mites that burrow into the skin. The main symptom of scabies is intense <u>itching</u> that's worse at night. It also causes a skin rash on areas where the mites have burrowed

The main symptoms of scabies are intense itching and a rash in areas of the body where the mites have burrowed.

The <u>itching</u> is often worse at night, when your skin is warmer. It may take 4 to 6 weeks before the itching starts because this is how long it takes for the body to react to mite droppings.

Symptoms will start within 1 to 2 days if you've had a scabies infection in the past. This is because your immune system will have learned to respond to a scabies infection.
