Dear Parents,

Firstly, where has the week gone and secondly where has April gone! Somehow this has all rushed past me and we are at the end of another week and 4 months through the year.

It's been a strange week for me as, due to various things, I haven't been in classrooms as much as I normally am but yesterday we had a visit from someone to come and support our phonics teaching. Whilst welcoming in outside professionals can lead to a little anxiety for the staffing team (we all just want to do our absolute best), it is a real pleasure for me to be able to show other professionals what a wonderful group of people I work with and also what amazing children we have. Despite the fact that Mrs Neary and I were supposed to monitoring too, we couldn't help but be distracted by our amazing children and what confident and resilient learners we have. We were blown away by Ella who talked about loving tricky work and Bobbi who said he loves a challenge. We were incredibly impressed by those in Blue Group and the level of participation — every single child joined in, even those who were not so confident (it can be a bit scary when adults you don't know descend on your lesson). And the children in Reception were just very enthusiastic and keen to show their phonic knowledge. To be clear, the visitor thought exactly the same as I did and complimented our staff on their phonic knowledge and on our children for their excellent learning behaviours. She left us with some great advice that will enable us to develop our provision even further.

## **Head of School Shining Light**

Every now and again, I have the pleasure of awarding a Shining Light to a pupil. They have to have worked incredibly hard to receive this! This week, I would like to award one to Fletcher in Year 3. Whilst it is vitally important that we educate our children in academic skills such as reading, writing and calculating, we also know how crucial it is that we foster skills and values in our children that will help them to become life-long learners and be able to meet any challenge with confidence, determination and a belief that they can succeed. There are times that we gently encourage our children to step out of their comfort zone and that is exactly what I did with Fletcher this week. He completely and utterly rose to the challenge and displayed incredible levels of resilience and perseverance for which he should feel very proud. Well done Fletcher and I am pleased to be able to award you a Shining Light from me.

#### Medicines.

We understand that there will be times when your child needs medication if they are poorly. Our policy is that where prescribed medications are concerned, we will administer them in accordance with the direction from the doctor. We also know that there are times your child may need medication that is not prescribed, such as paracetamol. We are happy to administer this medication but our policy states that we are only able to give one dose. If, after that does, your child's symptoms do not ease or improve then we will call you but we cannot administer any further doses. All medication must be handed into the school office and you will need to fill in a form. Medication must be in its original box or container. If you wish to see our policy for administering medicines it is available on the website or available from the school office.

## **PE Kits**

Please can I remind you that your child needs to have their PE kits in school from Monday to Friday and it needs to include a separate sweatshirt or jumper from their school one. We try and go outside as much as possible, especially the older children, and if they fall over wearing their school one it can become wet or dirty. If your child's kit becomes particularly wet or dirty then we will send it home!

#### Clubs

We are looking to get some more after school clubs up and running with the aim of offering one every day of the week. If you, or someone you know, feel able to offer some time and help run a club then please come and see us. It could be anything – craft, outdoor learning, games – the options are endless!

In Whitebeam Class we had a great start to the week (along with Rowan Class) as we were able to meet Rowan the lamb who came to visit on Monday afternoon. The children had lots of questions and loved how soft he was. We have started some new units of learning, in history we are learning about castles, kings and queens and we have placed some important kings and queens in chronological order on a timeline and will be learning about what makes them important over the coming weeks. We have also looked at what a trebuchet is and how it works and we will be making our own in DT and also using these to write about in our explanation texts. We have drawn, painted and labelled a motte and bailey castle and written about what it might have been like to visit one. We also recognised that we have the remains of one very close to us! In science we discussed and designed a picnic plate that could be eaten at a coronation picnic with the focus being on a balanced diet and recalling the different food groups. Well done Whitebeam for another super week.
